Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A most blessed Easter to you! We have come to the end of our yearly Lenten journey. Hopefully this Lenten season was one during which you were able to reflect on your identity as

Catholics and to realize how much your faith colors that identity. Hopefully your forty days of fasting, praying, and almsgiving brought you closer to Jesus as you renewed and strengthened your baptismal promises.

A good portion of this Lent was spent in a seemingly endless winter. Many people felt as though they had absorbed the gloomy grayness of the winter weather. Some felt 'shut in' and even sad. Such a feeling can be seen to parallel that of the Lenten 'pilgrims' who perhaps felt 'shut in' by their sinfulness, unable to overcome the same weaknesses that had pestered them for years. Such a feeling might have caused a spiritual tiredness after so many attempts to conquer their own sinfulness. *And yet...*they journeyed on, knowing that the sacrifices and challenges were well worth the struggle. They knew that God's mercy awaited them. Just as they knew that sooner or later spring would be "just around the corner," they knew that forgiveness was there for them. They need only ask.

Think about it...would Lent be as challenging if it occurred in the summer? There is no denying that we need to get through winter to arrive at spring. We also need to have Good Friday to get to Easter Sunday.

As Catholics, our *spring* is always there for us. Our Easter comes with warmer weather and flowers and renewed spirits. The sins that kept our best selves 'shut in' have been removed through the beautiful sacrament of Reconciliation. God's loving mercy is so great that it is able to roll back the stone of sin that keeps us in a spiritual place as gloomy and gray as the winter. Jesus saved us! He has given us hope that causes us to embrace and celebrate life. We turn to planting seeds that will grow into something colorful. We open windows and let in fresh air. We open our hearts and let in Jesus.

May your Easter and the joy and hope that you feel today be with you through all seasons. God bless you. *Father Piotr*

Dear Friends,

Truly the Lord is risen! He is risen indeed!

Today we speak these words which echo back to the first days of Christ’s resurrection. We celebrate the moment when Christ conquered death and gave us all hope of new life.

During this joyous season then, we recognize that the Risen Christ’s presence, his touch, his personal words of assurance tangibly changed the lives of his followers, as they can change our own lives even today. Though Christ ascended into heaven, we remember that we can still have a personal relationship with him through the gifts of the Holy Spirit and the Church which were given at Pentecost. His presence has never left us.

Indeed most powerfully, Christ’s presence remains in the Eucharist. While history tells us Christ lived 2,000 years ago, we know he still lives today. He is waiting in our churches for us to come spend time with him. He is waiting in our tabernacles for us to come adore him. He is waiting for us to join him at the Mass each Sunday, where we can share in his suffering, death, and resurrection as if we were by his side those many years ago.
