BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month. Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated during the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 9:30AM Polish Mass, or 11AM Mass in English. There will be no private Baptisms. Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. In order to receive a Sponsorship Certificate required by all Godparents, prospective Godmothers and Godfathers must be registered and supporting parishioners of Saint Ladislaus Church. Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism. Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.

Living My Faith This Advent

The weeks before Christmas have always been busy ones. One could probably paper a wall with the to-do lists that are compiled during the weeks leading up to Christmas Advent Day. True, there are countless chores to accomplish in

Day. True, there are countless chores to accomplish in preparation for Christmas. There are greeting cards to be sent, gifts to be bought, menus to be planned, cookies to be baked, homes to be decorated. Once we turn the calendar to the December page, the days seem to slip by very quickly. As the days dwindle, the stress increases. Let's pause a moment. This might be just the time to focus on the words of a familiar seasonal sign: "Keep Christ in Christmas." As we are preparing for the birthday of the Christ Child, it seems fitting that we ask ourselves, "What am I doing for Jesus? What gift would He want from me?" Indeed, any gift for our Lord will not be found at the mall or on Amazon.com.

Our Lord brings us the gift of peace. Our gift to Him might be to acknowledge that precious gift and put it to good use. It is not a gift to be put away on a shelf or exchanged for something more desirable. The Lord's peace is truly the gift that keeps giving. Peace doesn't depreciate over time; rather, it increases in value as it spreads to others. It generates smiles and acts of kindness. It enables us to face challenges with grace, to settle scores with fairness, to see a light in the darkness. Through peace, we "make straight the paths "to Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

As we gaze at the Advent wreath this weekend and see the second candle, **the candle of peace**, we might want to make a mental note to add another item to our to-do list. It is an item that won't cost a cent, won't leave you frazzled, and wont expend physical energy. What is this addendum to the list? **Make time for moments of peace and quiet.** Set aside five or ten minutes a day to sit in a comfortable space, and treat yourself to silence. Perhaps you can spend time looking at a Nativity scene. Focus on each of the figures in the manger. Imagine how each felt being present in such a special scene, a scene of blessed stillness.

Saint Teresa of Calcutta spoke these wise words: "In the silence of the heart, God speaks. If you face God in prayer and silence, God will speak to you. Souls of prayer are souls of great silence."

It seems to follow that souls of prayer are souls of peace. By introducing five or ten minutes of quiet prayer daily, you might find that the chores that haven't yet been checked off won't seem as onerous. Peace be with you!
