SUNDAY REFLECTION

The first Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the Church's liturgical year, a time of preparation and expectation. As we enter this season, we are invited to pause, reflect, and prepare our hearts for the coming of Christ, both in the celebration of His birth at Christmas and in His second coming at the end of time.

Advent is a season of hope. We are not just preparing for the historical event of Christ's birth but for the ultimate fulfillment of God's promises. The readings encourage us to look forward with hope, waiting for the day when Christ will return to bring fullness to His kingdom. In the midst of a world that can often feel uncertain or dark, Advent offers us the chance to place our trust in God's ultimate plan of salvation.

This season is also a time to prepare our hearts for Christ to enter more fully into our lives. Just as the people of Israel longed for a Messiah, we too are called to examine our lives, to repent where necessary, and to make room for Christ to reign more fully within us. This can take the form of prayer, acts of charity, and reconciliation, helping us to purify our hearts and minds as we await the coming of the Savior.

The first Sunday of Advent challenges us to embrace a spirit of preparedness, not only in our physical spaces (e.g., preparing our homes for Christmas) but also in our spiritual lives. We are invited to:

- ◆ Stay alert to the ways God is working in the world around us and to the stirrings of the Holy Spirit in our own hearts.
- ◆ Reflect on the need for renewal—spiritually, mentally, and emotionally—so that we can meet Christ at Christmas with joy and openness.
- ◆ Cultivate a sense of longing for Christ's return, which gives meaning to our daily struggles and hopes.

Consider using this first week of Advent as a time to set aside a few minutes each day to pray, reflect, or light an Advent candle as a simple symbol of the light of Christ coming into the world. Let this practice serve as a reminder to stay alert and focused on what is truly important as we prepare for the coming of Christ—not just at Christmas, but in all aspects of our lives.

CATECHISM *of the* CATHOLIC CHURCH

Can God do anything? Is he almighty?

“For God nothing is impossible” (see Lk 1:37).

He is almighty. Anyone who calls on God in need believes that he is all-powerful. God created the world out of nothing. He is the Lord of history. He guides all things and to - an do everything. How he uses his omnipotence is of course a mystery. Not infrequently people ask, Where was God then? Through the prophet Isaiah he tells us, “My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways.” (Is 55:8).

Often God's omnipotence is displayed in a situation where men no longer expect anything from it. The powerlessness of Good Friday was the prerequisite for the Resurrection.



ZAREJESTRUJ SIĘ DO NASZEJ PARAFII

Serdecznie witamy nowych członków parafii i zapraszamy do rejestracji w Biurze Parafialnym. Rejestracji w kościele św. Władysława można dokonać pobierając formularze w sekretariacie lub przy wejściu do kościoła. Jedną z najważniejszych rzeczy, którą powinni zrobić mieszkańców parafii, jest rejestracja. Rejestracja w parafii nie tylko czyni Cię bardziej częścią rodziny kościoła św. Władysława ale także daje Tobie i Twojej rodzinie szansę na bycie usłyszszanym w parafii.



KATECHIZM KOŚCIOŁA KATOLICKIEGO

Czy Jezus jest Bogiem ? Czy natęży do Trójcy Świętej?

Jezus z Nazaretu jest Synem, drugą Osobą Boską, którą wspominamy, czyniąc znak krzyża: „W imię Ojca i Syna, i Ducha Świętego” (Mt 28, 19). [243-260] Jezus był albo oszustem, kiedy czynił siebie Panem -» SZABATU i kazał zwracać się do siebie boskim tytułem „Pan”, albo był rzeczywiście Bogiem. Kiedy zaczął odpuszczać grzechy wywołało to skandal. W oczach Jemu współczesnych to było przewinienie zasługujące na karę śmierci. Przez cuda i znaki, szczególnie jednak przez Zmartwychwstanie, uczniowie poznali, kim jest Jezus, i modlili się do Niego jako do Pana. To jest wiara Kościoła.

ROZWAŻANIE NA NIEDZIELĘ

Pierwsza niedziela Adwentu to początek roku liturgicznego w Kościele, czasu przygotowania i oczekiwania. Wkraczając w ten okres, jesteśmy zaproszeni do zatrzymania się, refleksji i przygotowania naszych serc na przyjście Chrystusa, zarówno w świętowaniu Jego narodzin w Boże Narodzenie, jak i w Jego drugim przyjściu na końcu czasów.

Adwent jest okresem nadziei. Nie przygotowujemy się tylko na historyczne wydarzenie narodzin Chrystusa, ale na ostateczne wypełnienie obietnic Bożych. Czytania zachęcają nas do patrzenia w przyszłość z nadzieją, czekając na dzień, w którym Chrystus powróci, aby przynieść pełnię swojemu królestwu. Pośród świata, który często może wydawać się niepewny lub ciemny, Adwent daje nam szansę, aby zaufać ostatecznemu planowi zbawienia Boga.

Ten okres jest również czasem, aby przygotować nasze serca na to, aby Chrystus wszedł pełniej do naszego życia. Tak jak lud Izraela pragnął Mesjasza, my również jesteśmy wezwani do zbadania naszego życia, do pokuty, gdy jest to konieczne, i do stworzenia przestrzeni, aby Chrystus mógł w nas pełniej panować. Może to przybrać formę modlitwy, aktów miłosierdzia i pojednania, pomagając nam oczyścić nasze serca i umysły, gdy oczekujemy na przyjście Zbawiciela.

Pierwsza niedziela Adwentu rzuca nam wyzwanie, abyśmy przyjęli ducha gotowości, nie tylko w naszej aktywności zewnętrznej (np. przygotowując nasze domy na Boże Narodzenie), ale także w naszym życiu duchowym. Jesteśmy zaproszeni do:

- Pozostawiania czujnym na sposoby, w jakie Bóg działa w otaczającym nas świecie i na poruszenia Ducha Świętego w naszych własnych sercach.
- Rozważania nad potrzebą odnowy — duchowej, psychicznej i emocjonalnej — abyśmy mogli spotkać Chrystusa w Boże Narodzenie z radością i otwartością.
- Pielęgnowania poczucia troski za powrotem Chrystusa, co nadaje sens naszym codziennym zmaganiom i nadzieję.

Rozważ wykorzystanie tego pierwszego tygodnia Adwentu jako czasu na poświęcenie kilku minut każdego dnia na modlitwę, refleksję lub zapalenie świecy adwentowej jako prostego symbolu światła Chrystusa przychodzącego na świat. Niech ta praktyka będzie dla nas przypomnieniem, żebyśmy pozostały czujni i skupieni na tym, co naprawdę ważne, gdy przygotowujemy się na przyjście Chrystusa — nie tylko w czasie świąt Bożego Narodzenia, ale w każdym aspekcie naszego życia.

COMUNIDAD HISPANO

REFLEXIONES DEL EVANGELIO

Hoy, justo al comenzar un nuevo año litúrgico, hacemos el propósito de renovar nuestra ilusión y nuestra lucha personal con vista a la santidad, propia y de todos. Nos invita a ello la propia Iglesia, recordándonos en el Evangelio de hoy la necesidad de estar siempre preparados, siempre “enamorados” del Señor: «Guardaos de que no se hagan pesados vuestros corazones por el libertinaje, por la embriaguez y por las preocupaciones de la vida» (Lc 21,34).

Pero notemos un detalle que es importante entre enamorados: esta actitud de alerta —de preparación— no puede ser intermitente, sino que ha de ser permanente. Por esto, nos dice el Señor: «Estad en vela, pues, orando en todo tiempo» (Lc 21,36). ¡En todo tiempo!: ésta es la justa medida del amor. La fidelidad no se hace a base de un “ahora sí, ahora no”. Es, por tanto, muy conveniente que nuestro ritmo de piedad y de formación espiritual sea un ritmo habitual (día a día y semana a semana). Ojalá que cada jornada de nuestra vida la vivamos con mentalidad de estrenarnos; ojalá que cada mañana —al despertarnos— logremos decir: —Hoy vuelvo a nacer (¡gracias, Dios mío!); hoy vuelvo a recibir el Bautismo; hoy vuelvo a hacer la Primera Comunión; hoy me vuelvo a casar... Para perseverar con aire alegre hay que “reestrenarse” y renovarse.

En esta vida no tenemos ciudad permanente. Llegará el día en que incluso «las fuerzas de los cielos serán sacudidas» (Lc 21,26). ¡Buen motivo para permanecer en estado de alerta! Pero, en este Adviento, la Iglesia añade un motivo muy bonito para nuestra gozosa preparación: ciertamente, un día los hombres «verán venir al Hijo del hombre en una nube con gran poder y gloria» (Lc 21,27), pero ahora Dios llega a la tierra con mansedumbre y discreción; en forma de recién nacido, hasta el punto que «Cristo se vio envuelto en pañales dentro de un pesebre» (San Cirilo de Jerusalén). Sólo un espíritu atento descubre en este Niño la magnitud del amor de Dios y su salvación (cf. Sal 84,8).

DEL CATECISMO DE LA IGLESIA CATOLICA



¿Las ciencias naturales hacen innecesario al Creador?

No. La frase "Dios ha creado el mundo" no es una afirmación ya superada de las ciencias naturales. Se trata de una afirmación teológica, es decir, una afirmación sobre el sentido (theos = Dios, logos = sentido) y el origen divino de las cosas. [282-289]

El relato de la Creación no es un modelo explicativo del principio del mundo. "Dios ha creado el mundo" es una afirmación teológica sobre la relación del mundo con Dios. Dios ha querido que exista el mundo; él lo acompaña y lo llevará a plenitud. Ser creadas es una cualidad permanente en las cosas y una verdad elemental acerca de ellas.

This organization, which has a center on Fulton Avenue in Hempstead, helps expectant women in need by offering necessary support services and counseling. All services are free.


As we enter the season of gift-giving, we are made aware of the great need for items related to baby care.
