BAPTISM:

The sacrament of Baptism (English, Polish) is celebrated on the 2nd and 4th weekends of the month. Because our parish family is welcoming a new member to our faith community, Baptisms will be celebrated during the following Masses: 5PM Saturday vigil Mass in English, 10:30AM Polish Mass, or 11:45 Mass in English. There will be no private Baptisms. Those chosen as Godparents must be practicing, Confirmed Catholics whose lives reflect a commitment to the Catholic faith and to the role of Godparent. Parents must register their child prior to the Baptism. Parents of first children are required to receive instruction. The sacrament of Baptism (Spanish) is celebrated during the 4PM Mass on the 2nd and 4th Sundays of the month. Guidelines for pre-Baptismal registration and instruction are the same for all Baptisms.

Living our faith : being "faithful and prudent stewards"

Saint Luke's Gospel tells us, "Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." I think that we are mistaken if we think of the "much" and the "more" as referring solely to money; it does make sense, however, to assume that those with wealth have a greater responsibility to give more than those whose bank accounts are not as full. We do better to think of the other gifts we possess, namely, the gifts of time and talent. Perhaps we think that humility doesn't lend itself to an honest appraisal of our gifts. Not so! A truly humble person recognizes his/her gifts and acknowledges that they come from God and ought to be shared. Each of us has gifts that can bring happiness to others or serve to lighten their burdens.

Do we delay the sharing? Do we put off using our time and talents until the children are out of school or until we retire? True, we can all find matters that we deem to have greater immediacy, chores that find a top spot on our to-do lists. When we think about acts of charity, we should realize that our charitable deeds need not be grandiose or occupy a great amount of time. One phone call a week to a person who lives alone or a personal note or greeting card sent to someone who needs companionship does not require much expense of energy or time. Putting extra food items in our shopping cart and taking them to a food pantry doesn't require much expenditure of money or time.

Nowadays we hear much talk of planning for our financial futures, creating emergency funds, and making preparations for the "hour we do not expect." Such concerns are necessary and are made with the welfare of loved ones in mind. That being said, we also do not want to be *spiritually* unprepared when we are called to our heavenly home. After all, chances are we won't be holding a bank statement when the Son of Man finally comes! Today's gospel prompts us to discover our true treasure and to let our heart direct how and when it will be used.
